MAIN TAKE-AWAYS

Sex worker health and harm reduction is much more than sexual health.

Sex work is the exchange of sexual services for material resources.

There is no one profile of a sex worker. Sex workers come from every identity and background, but the impacts of structural violence disparately harm marginalized sex workers.

Not everyone will use the term "sex work" or "sex worker" to describe their experience or identity. With clients, reflect their language.

Different areas of sex work have different levels of risk and not all behaviors carry the same risk for all people.

We confront our narratives and ideas about sex workers by connecting to sex worker community, expanding our media consumption and being self-reflective.

Sex workers identify both structural and interpersonal barriers to accessing care.
